Hot Topics

Depression Screening was once again the hottest topic on our discussion forum! While initial questions asked for help to identify tools used for screening, more recent discussion centered on the sharing of existing depression screening protocols amongst organizations.

Canadian Stroke Best Practice Guidelines recommend depression screening using a validated tool and screening across the stroke care continuum. However, timing of this assessment is not clear and the best standardized tool has yet to be identified. There is still some disagreement about whether doing depression screening in the acute care phase provides a valid measure. Moreover, once depression is identified, referrals to appropriate mental health services need to be made and a process for follow is needed.

We have had input from St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto Western Hospital, Providence Healthcare, Mackenzie Health, and North York General Hospital. There are two relevant discussion forums: Depression Screening and Post-Stroke Depression.

Mackenzie Health has shared a protocol with VCoP Members which outlines the use of the PHQ-9 by their stroke team and Providence Healthcare has shared a Psychosocial Decision Making Flowchart. You can access both resources by visiting the discussion forum tab on the VCoP, clicking on depression screening, and then clicking on "developing a plan".

As always, we are stronger together than we are apart...please join the discussion and be heard as we continue to work towards consensus on this valuable clinical issue!

VCoP User Tips

Groups – How to Use this Feature

The key features of the VCoP are: Membership Directory, Groups, Discussion Forum and Member Resources

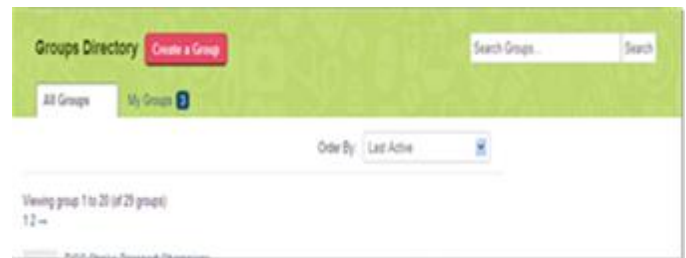
A few points about Groups:

- The Groups feature of VCoP allows for collaboration, learning, sharing and planning
- A public group is accessible by any member of the VCoP community
- A private group is accessible only to approved group members.
- In both public and private groups any group member can add a post, start a discussion, attach a document etc.

Learn how to join an existing group or create a new group in a few simple steps.

To join an existing Group:

1. Log into your VCoP account and click on the "Groups" tab on the grey navigation bar.
2. Browse the groups listed under "all groups". If you don't know the name of the group you want to join you can use the "Search Groups" bar in the upper right hand corner.
3. To join a public group, simply click "Join Group".
4. To join a private group, click "Request Membership". The group administrator will have to approve your request before you can gain access to the group page. You will be notified through the VCoP once your membership has been approved.



5. Once you are part of a group, you have different options for notifications you can receive from the group. Click "Get e-mail Updates" or "Change" to view or select the different mailing options.



To create a new Group:

1. Log into your VCoP account
2. Click on the "Groups" tab on the grey navigation bar
3. Click on "Create a Group" button
4. You will be asked to name your group and provide a brief description of the group
5. You will then be guided through a few simple steps
6. The individual who sets up the group will be the administrator for that group

Educational Opportunities

Positioning, Transfer & Mobility DVD & Facilitator's Guide

Description:

The Positioning, Transfer & Mobility DVD and accompanying Facilitator's Guide are intended as tools for educators /facilitators to enhance the learning experience.

Content:

The DVD is 30 minutes in length and is comprised of the following sections: safety, positioning, bed mobility, transfers, mobility. The manual follows the sequence of the DVD and is structured in a manner which allows the facilitator to engage the participants in active learning using adult learning principles. Each section contains: key points to reinforce, questions for discussion, and practice exercises.

Web-based Certificate Programs

NIHSS Online Training and Certification

Description:

The National Institutes of Health Stroke Scale (NIHSS) is a valid and reliable 15 –item neurological examination scale used to determine degree of neurological deficit in acute stroke patients.

This program is intended for physicians, nurses or therapists who perform neurological assessments on stroke patients in the Emergency Department or Acute Care.

Certificate will be provided upon successful completion of the module.

NOTE: If you are planning to apply for a Hemispheres™ license, the NIHSS module will be included in the curriculum.

Cost:

The NIHSS module is Free for all health professionals

How to access the NIHSS online module:

1. Go to the Apex Innovations home page, www.apexinnovations.com and click on 'Create NIHSS Account'.
2. Put in name of your organization in the appropriate box
3. Further down the page you will see "not an existing user, but have a license key?" Click there to create account and use this (case sensitive) License Key: **ABYRQZ8J**

- Certificate upon successful completion of the entire series

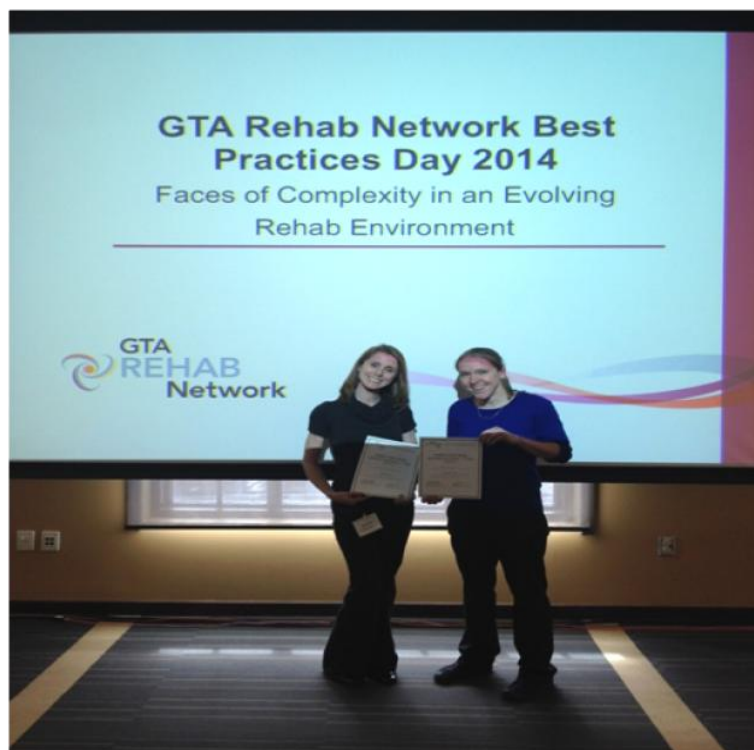
Cost:

VCoP Evaluation Informing Improvements

Earlier this year, the VCoP was evaluated through a number of focus groups and individual interviews which many of you participated in. Your valuable input is informing priorities for functional changes to the VCoP this year in order to better meet our needs as a learning community.

The value of the VCoP in **building professional networks** was the primary theme identified in this study.
